Timeline

Picture the Music (PTM) is a free hands-on classroom activity and competition that invites students in grades K-6 to create artwork inspired by a specific orchestral work. As students listen to the music, they respond with a painting or drawing that expresses creative thought and emotion inspired by the music. Teachers submit the top seven works of art from their school to enter the competition. A panel of experts in visual arts and art education review the submitted artwork and select the top 100 works. These student artists are honored at an award ceremony and their art is displayed in a traveling exhibit.

Artwork Collection and Framing Day

Volunteers coordinate the collection of the top 100 pieces of artwork. They also prepare and frame the artwork for the awards ceremony and traveling exhibit. This includes getting the frames from storage, cleaning the frames, trimming the artwork to fit the frames, framing the artwork, and creating a diagram for the artwork display.

Awards Ceremony

Before the awards ceremony, volunteers assemble the art exhibit, set up the check-in tables, reserve seats, and prepare awards. At the awards ceremony volunteers check in the young artists, lead them to and from the stage, welcome the audience, present awards, and provide photography support. During the awards ceremony, volunteers also attach ribbons to artwork that receives special recognition.

Traveling Exhibit

Volunteers transport, assemble, and disassemble the PTM exhibit at each venue.

Returning Artwork

Volunteers unframe the artwork and return it to teachers during artwork pickup days or by mail.
