Sakana Foundation

Major support for the League's <u>Inclusive Stages</u> program, aimed at increasing musician racial diversity at American orchestras.

- Now expanded to include youth orchestras, educational institutions, and pathway programs
- Helping orchestras establish best practices and processes for musician recruitment and tenure
- Providing data-driven insights to help fuel change

\$100,000 in new support for:
